It was several years ago and just a moment ago.

A man who made the world better in a very big way was Fred Rogers. His television show, "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood," broke away from the usual kid-vid style to emphasize kindness, equality and being a good neighbor to all. Bisbee's Copper Queen Library and KBRP Media are hosting a screening of Morgan Neville's documentary, "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" on Wednesday at 5 p.m at The Bisbee Royale, 94 Main St.

The Hollywood Reporter says the film is "both nostalgic and immediate ... a documentary you want to hug." Neville describes Rogers' approach as "radical kindness." Through his show's 33 years on the air, Rogers valued silence, companionship, community and gentleness.

The world changed, but his neighborhood stayed true. Mr. Rogers said, "You rarely have time for everything you want in this life, so you need to make choices. And hopefully your choices can come from a deep sense of who you are." Bring tissues.

National Hispanic Heritage Month is prompting some interesting events. Thursday, the Huachuca City Public Library is hosting Dan Valle, the international director of the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, who will speak on the role of Hispanics in the United States.
