CQL WINS AWARD EXCELLENCE IN SERVICE

The Copper Queen Library was awarded the EBSCO Excellence in Rural Library Service Award last month by the Public Library Association of America. The national award, which is co-sponsored by EBSCO Information Services, provides recognition and an honorarium to a public library that demonstrates excellence of service to its community as exemplified by an overall service program or a special program of significant accomplishment.

The Library received the award for its commitment to service and its innovative programs including the Internet Hotspot Lending Program (LiFi), the Seed Library, and the San Jose Annex which offers full library services and a community space in the San Jose Neighborhood.

The award will be presented at the Public Library Association's President's Program at the American Library Association Annual Conference and Exhibition in June in Washington D.C.

Dawn-Michelle Baude is an international author, educator, and Senior Fulbright Scholar who has published several books and chapbooks of poetry, including *Egypt*, *The Flying House* and *Finally: A Calendar*. Her poetry has appeared in *New American Writing*, *Verse*, *First Intensity*, *Talisman*, and *Interim*, among other magazines and websites. After spending eighteen years in Europe and the Middle East, she moved to Las Vegas in 2011. She is currently at work on a memoir. Dawn was an interim Director of Cochise Fine Arts, and co-directed the 1981 Bisbee Poetry Festival with Dick Bakken.

COMING THIS MAY

Beginning in May, readers in Cochise County will be able to use their existing library cards at any public library location countywide. One County, One Card is a joint project of the Cochise County Library District and the seven municipal libraries across Cochise County. The cooperation between libraries gives residents access to more than 200,000 titles and allows them to use multiple libraries. Until now, library users have been required to register for a separate library card at each location they wished to use. This has been inconvenient for patrons while creating unnecessary paperwork for library staff and volunteers.

The libraries have laid the groundwork for One County, One Card over the last two years by adopting a modern online library catalog, allowing for credit card payments, and removing outdated and inactive records from the library system.

The final step is to identify library users with multiple accounts and have them select a "home library" location. When duplicate accounts have been consolidated, the patron database can be set to work across all library locations.

Residents who have a single library card in good standing will not need to take any action in preparation for One County, One Card.

Residents who have library cards at more than one Cochise County library are asked to check in with their local library by May 3. After they confirm their contact information and any existing library accounts, they can choose which library card they would like to continue using. The library they choose will be their "home library," but they will have full access to all twelve libraries and will not need to apply for a new card.

Residents who have lost items or charges at any library location are asked to settle their accounts by May 3 to ensure uninterrupted service.
